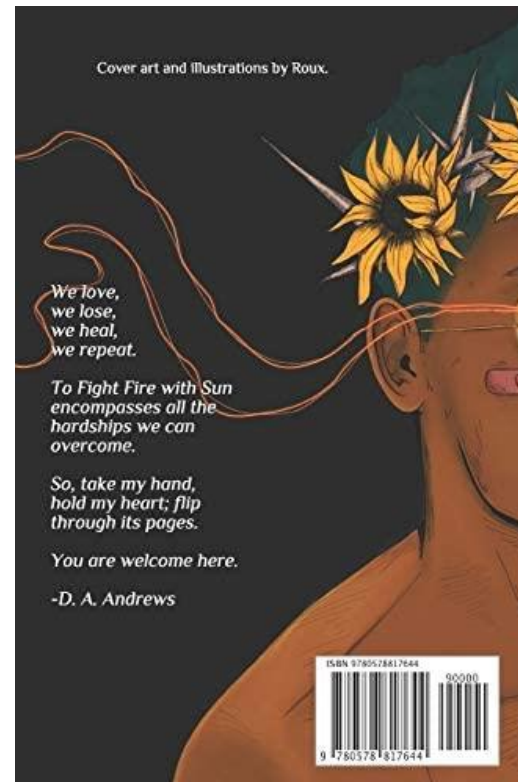

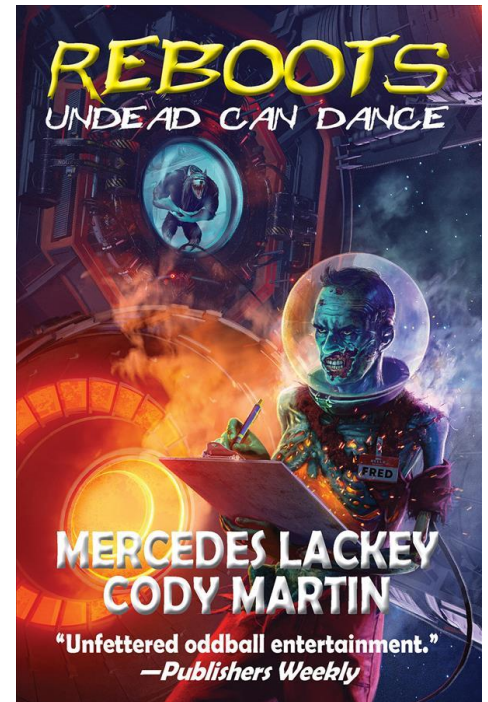

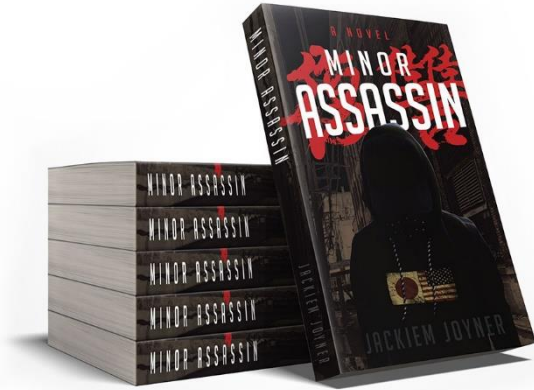

[Jackiem Joyner](#) doesn't hold back in the descriptions of the graphic scenes of [this action-packed book](#), be it in the fight scenes or in emotionally charged situations. We loved the original plot idea, a *kid-assassin on a mission to avenge his family*, and apparently all the other characters, including our well written cops that partake in much of the action and make a great contribution to this story, are *as* surprised as readers will be with the whole concept of a child assassin, although, we readers have a *much* easier time adjusting towards this whole concept.

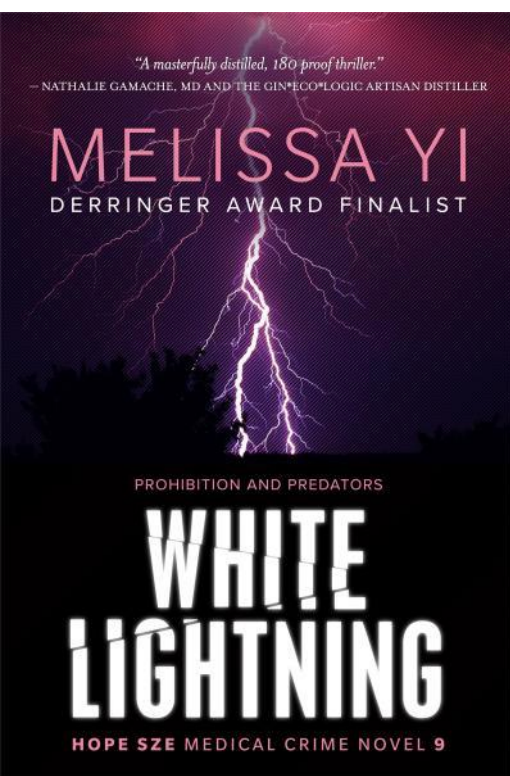

“White Lightning” by Melissa Yi

Well put mysteries and slowly rising tension, make this book interesting from the start and the book starts off great with Melissa Yi setting the tone to many possibilities, and none of them good, as two boys put themselves in a risky situation on what it seems like an orphanage, and we start asking

ourselves what are the boys into and how are they relevant to the story as we are taken back to the present, to our main characters and the start of their little adventure on what it turns out to be a historical place for bootlegging and rumrunning called the Rumrunner’s Rest, but this place has much more mysteries and lessons for them than they might imagine.



Melissa’s narrative is interactive, sarcastic and suggestive to the reader as she, through our narrator, Hope, asks questions of reassurance to the reader, makes ironic comments towards things and even mentally scolds herself when she does something she shouldn’t. It’s very interesting to read that, and the way it was written increased the likability of the story.

This is a cool book for people that love quirky facts of History, and certain old periods of societies, the implications of those times, forbidden romances, alcohol, parties, ghosts and mysteries.

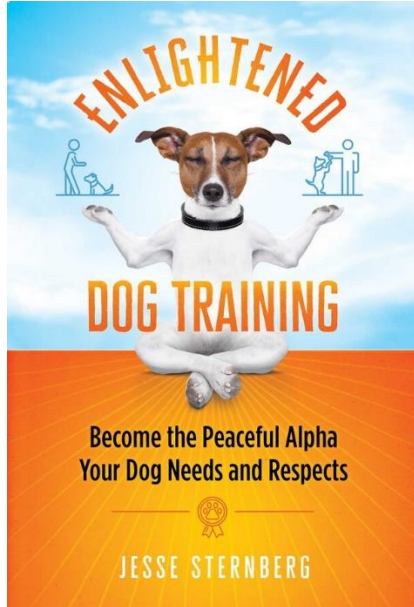

In this amazingly well written book, [Enlightened Dog Training](#), you will find how your own body language affects the behavior of your dog *and* how changing it will help you get the results that you want from your pet, and how to “speak” to your dog. Yes, Jesse Sternberg will teach you how to speak to your dog.

If you are thinking: “*This is crazy, communicate with my dog with my body? That’s impossible*”, well, I would invite you to re-consider this, because, in the “animal world” body language makes most of the communication process within individuals, and regardless if we are aware of it or

not, our bodies are ALWAYS sending signals of what we are thinking, feeling and trying to say.

“It’s easier for a human to learn the Secret Language of Dogs than it is for dogs to learn English (or any other language).” – Jesse Sternberg

Dogs have a “secret language” and although we, as pet owners may know our pet’s moods, whims and wants most of the time, there is always something that we miss now and then, and the author Jesse Sternberg, explains the signals dogs send with certain behaviors and how to interpret them.

This book also teaches mindfulness for us and how to control our behaviors, both to better communicate with our dogs, but also how to be better people.
